Activity title: Europe Game – Gamification activities at the Europe Game Center **Location**:Europe Game Center, Vila Nova de Famalicão (Portugal)

Objectives:

- Deepen your knowledge of the European Union, its institutions and its values
- Promote cooperation and interaction between students of different nationalities
- Develop communication in English
- Strengthening the sense of European citizenship through play

Description of the activity:

The students participated in a gamification activity at the Europe Game Center in Vila Nova de Famalicão. The activity took place in an immersive and interactive context, designed to educate in an engaging way on the themes of the European Union. Divided into mixed international groups, the participants faced a path in stages consisting of:

- Interactive quizzes on European history, geography and institutions
- · Linguistic and cooperative challenges
- Logic and problem solving tests related to EU values

Each test required collaboration, quick thinking and effective communication in English

Methodology:

- Experiential learning in a non-formal context

Skills developed:

- Civic and citizenship skills
- Language skills in L2 (English)
- Ability to cooperate and solve problems Intercultural communication

Assessment:

The evaluation took place in an observational form, through monitoring the interaction between peers, active involvement and the ability to apply knowledge in new contexts.

The activity was extremely engaging and educational. The playful mode and the environment The innovative approach of the centre has fostered learning, motivation and cooperation between students of different nationalities, consolidating key European competences in a dynamic and participatory way.

Further exploration and reflection:

Following the activity at the Europe Game Center, students created a series of multimedia projects as a reflection on the experience and the topics explored. Under the title "United in diversity – Europe and citizenship" the works address in a personal and creative way the founding values of the European Union, the concept of European citizenship, and the meaning of unity in diversity. These projects, developed in French and in English, were created based on a set of guidelines provided by the teachers and represent a meaningful outcome of the overall educational journey.

Evaluation activity

Introduction:

This evaluation activity is based on the historical importance of the Schuman Declaration of 9th May 1950, which marked the beginning of the European integration process. The goal is to help students critically analyze the content and the long-term implications of the declaration, and to reflect on the progress made in the construction of the European Union.

The 9th May 1950 Declaration and the European Union

Part 1: Analyzing the Schuman Declaration

Answer these questions based on the text:

- Who wrote this text? When was it written? To whom is it addressed, and for what purpose? (4 points)
- What actions are proposed to build a united Europe?

Reflect on the concrete steps suggested in the declaration for the formation of the European Union.

• How many countries are currently members of the European Union? Do you think Robert Schuman's idea "worked well"?

(2 points)

Consider the growth of the EU and discuss whether Schuman's vision has come to fruition.

Part 2: Completing the text on Europe Day

Complete with the following words:

exchanges, vocation, overcome, celebrations, as, should, bring closer, regarding, diversity, must, convivial, meeting

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Each year, Europe Day is celebrated on 9th May in the 27 Member States of the European Union.
Referring to the 9th May 1950 Declaration by Robert Schuman, considered the founding text of European
integration, Europe Day is an opportunity to the European institutions with the citizens and to
promote between the European peoples in a and festive atmosphere. Highlighting the
richness and of European cultures is the of Europe Day.
The 9th May celebration should also serve to bring citizens closer to Europe and the sense of
distance, indifference, or even alienation that they may feel the European institutions. It is a
moment when the symbols of the European Union be fully appreciated national celebrations,
a strong presence of European flags is necessary, not only in reserved spaces for but also, and
especially, in windows. Finally, the 9th May be a day of popular celebration and between men
and women from various cities, regions, and countries of Europe.

5. How do you think you can actively participate in the democratic life of the European Union in the future? For example, by voting in elections or through other forms of engagement? (5 points)

Evaluation grid

Excellent (40-48 points): The student demonstrates outstanding understanding, creativity, and reflection. The work is original, detailed, and well-organized.

Good (31-39 points): The student shows good understanding and creativity with minor gaps in details or reflection. The work is well-organized and well-presented.

Satisfactory (22-30 points): The student demonstrates an adequate understanding of the topic with some incomplete or inaccurate information. The presentation could be improved.

Insufficient (below 22 points): The student has missed important details, lacks critical reflection, and the quality of the work is below expectations.
